Member Kelleher stated that on the taxiway slide there was a taxiway shown on the west side, that also being envisioned as part of this project. Dr. Martin answered yes.

Report/Discussion: Northeast Corner Demolition Bid Update

#### **Background**:

On December 2, 2009, the March Joint Powers Commission approved the March LifeCare Campus Specific Plan (SP-4) and certified a Final EIR (SCH#2008071021), for the design and construction of approximately 3.55 million square feet of healthcare related building areas and 2.5 million square feet of parking area on approximately 236-acres of March JPA properties in its Northeast Corner. Since the approval of the project, the JPA has demolished former military buildings throughout the Northeast corner to help facilitate the medical campus development; however, five buildings and accessory structures were not demolished due to occupancy by service organizations and/or individual renters.

By the end of 2021, four of the five remaining buildings were abandoned while the church building remained intact and occupied. Since no development has occurred within the Northeast Corner and the timing of future projects are unknown, four of the vacated buildings have become public nuisances with regular break-ins, loitering, theft of wire, pipes and other building material, vandalism and fires, drawing attention from local law enforcement and private security services on a weekly basis.

In order to address public safety issues within the Northeast Corner, and minimize ongoing security costs to the March JPA, on August 23, 2023, the March Joint Powers Commission authorized the advertising of Request for Proposals for the demolition of the four buildings:

- Building 962 (former Dining Hall)
- Building 976 (former Smith Hall Dormitory/722 LGS)
- ▶ Building 2604 (former Family Support Center), and
- Building 2605 (former Operations Building).

On April 30, 2024, Staff released the bid document for the demolition of the four buildings and two accessory structures:

- Armory Building (with Building 2604)
- Building 2606 (Power Plant for Building 2605)



On July 11, 2024, nine bids were received, with a total bid cost ranging from \$1,764,209 to \$3,234,794. While the lowest bid was \$1,764,209, this exceeded the approved budget amount of \$500,000. After reviewing all bids received, contacting references and verifying qualifications, staff has decided not to award the contract and will inform all bidders of this decision. In addition, staff will revise and reissue the bid document, with a reduced scope, focusing on the most problematic buildings: Building 962 and Building 976. Staff hopes to reissue the bid document in October or November 2024.

**<u>Report/Discussion</u>**: March LifeCare Campus Project Update

#### **Background**:

The March Joint Powers Redevelopment Agency ("Agency") and March Healthcare Development, LLC, a California limited liability company ("MHD"), entered into the March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement dated April 7, 2010 (the "Original Agreement"). The Original Agreement was subsequently amended on March 7, 2012 and on September 29, 2018. The Original Agreement, as amended ("Agreement"), was to develop approximately 160 acres into a variety of medical and offices uses, including potentially a hospital facility ("Project").

Following the execution of the Agreement, the Agency assigned certain rights, duties, and obligations under the DDA to the March Joint Powers Authority ("Authority") to facilitate the sale and development of the Property. Following the adoption of ABX1 26, the Successor Agency to the March Joint Powers Redevelopment Agency ("Successor Agency") assumed the Agency's position as a party to the DDA.

On January 22, 2016, MHD assigned its rights in and to the DDA to March1 LLC ("M1" or "March1"), an affiliate of MHD. On March 7, 2012, with the elimination of redevelopment agencies throughout California, development responsibilities on the Project were assigned from the Successor Agency to the Authority. Specifically, the amendment to the Agreement assigned the Successor Agency's right, title, and interest in and to, and obligations pursuant to Section 6.03 of the DDA, Schedule of Performance, and the associated Exhibit D to the Authority.

At the March 28, 2018, Joint Powers Commission meeting, both the March Joint Powers Authority and Successor Agency approved the Partial Assignment and Assumption and Amendment of Disposition and Development Agreement. The Commission approved the Second Amendment to the Disposition and Development Agreement, memorializing the DDA assignment, on September 26, 2018.

#### Third Amendment

Since the execution of the Second Amendment to the March LifeCare Campus DDA, March1 has failed to deliver improvements outlined within Exhibit D-1 of the Agreement. In a show of good faith, the March JPA offered negotiations for a short-term extension to allow the developer to complete required Exhibit D-1 improvements. Those negotiations resulted in two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) payable to the March JPA, and extensions of time to complete Amended Exhibit D-1 Improvements that included the completion of a Pressure Reducing Valve (PRV) Facility; street, sidewalk and landscaping refurbishments.

Certain improvements were to be completed within six (6) months of the effective date of the Third Amendment while others were required to be completed within eight (8) months of the effective date of the Third Amendment, except if tolled in accordance with the provisions in the Amendment.

#### Fourth Amendment

Of the listed improvements, March1 successfully completed all items except the PRV.

On December 26, 2022, March1 submitted a letter to the JPA. In the Letter, March1 (i) requested further amendment to that certain March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement entered into by and between the Authority and March1, as successorsin-interest by assignment, as of April 7, 2010 (DDA), for purposes of clarifying the definition of "Notice to Proceed" (NTP), and (ii) proposes to change the deadline by which March1 must complete the Pressure Reducing Valve (PRV) to the date that is six months after the date that Western Municipal Water District (Western) approves an amendment (Amendment) to that separate Water Facility Construction Agreement (the "Western-Meridian Agreement") originally made on March 8, 2021, by and among Western, Meridian Park, LLC, (Meridian), and a subcontractor of Meridian. The Amendment addressed the reimbursement by Western to Meridian of certain construction cost increases in connection with the PRV construction that Meridian claims occurred while awaiting the NTP. It was the Authority's understanding that Meridian, as the developer of a separate property adjacent to the March LifeCare Campus site, entered into a separate agreement (PRV Agreement) with March1, pursuant to which Meridian constructed the PRV, and the total cost was allocated among Meridian, March1, and Riverside Inland Development, LLC, because the PRV benefits each of their respective projects.

The Authority was not a party to the Western-Meridian Agreement or the PRV Agreement. Pursuant to the DDA, March1 is the entity accountable to the Authority for, among other things, meeting all deadlines related to the PRV. Western is the agency with approval jurisdiction over the construction of the PRV.

As an initial matter, the Authority respectfully disagreed with assertions March1 made in the Letter. Namely, the Authority did not agree that: (i) the language in the Third Amendment to the DDA dated as of January 26, 2022 (<u>Third Amendment</u>), "*will never trigger the start of the 6-month completion period*" of the PRV, and (ii) the NTP issued by Western "*does not actually allow Meridian to begin construction*" of the PRV, and that Meridian is prohibited from beginning construction of the PRV until "*after the [amendment to the Western-Meridian Agreement] is approved by [Western and Meridian].*"

The Authority's disagreement with March1's assertions above was based on the following:

- 1. Western issued the NTP with respect to the PRV on October 11, 2022, and March1 received a copy of said NTP by email from Meridian on that same day. The language in the Third Amendment is clear that the deadline to complete the PRV is calculated from the date that March1 "*receives*" the NTP; it does not require the NTP to be "issued" to March1. Whether March1 receives a copy of the NTP directly from Western, through Meridian, or from the Authority does not alter the substance of the NTP or negate the fact that March1 indeed received it. Therefore, pursuant to the Third Amendment, the deadline to complete the PRV is April 11, 2023, that is six months from October 11, 2022.
- 2. The language in the NTP expressly states that the work on the PRV "*can now proceed.*" The NTP does not mention the Western-Meridian Agreement that is already in place nor is it conditioned upon the approval of the Amendment. The decision to delay proceeding with the PRV construction until after the Amendment is executed does not create a condition that impacts the milestone dates set forth in the DDA. March1, as the party obligated to the Authority to meet the PRV completion deadline, has an obligation to mitigate any delay in completing the construction of the PRV. One way that March1 could have mitigated the delay was by contributing to the cost differential while Western went through its approval process for the Amendment. March1 did not do so, thus contributing to the delay.

Nevertheless, given the progress March1 made with respect to the deadlines set forth in the Third Amendment, the Authority approved another amendment to the DDA (Fourth Amendment) extending the deadline by which the PRV was to be completed no later than July 31, 2023, subject, but not limited, to the following conditions:

Extension of Time to Complete the PRV Facility. The Authority hereby grants Developer the Extension, subject to the following:

- a. Developer shall complete, or cause to be completed, the PRV Facility not later than July 31, 2023;
- b. The completion of the PRV Facility shall be evidenced by the issuance of a notice of completion ("Notice of Completion") by Western Municipal Water District ("Western"), subject only to punch list items, if any, identified by Western at Western's discretion;
- c. Developer shall promptly deliver, or cause to be delivered to Authority a copy of the Notice of Completion within two (2) days of its issuance; and
- d. Failure to timely provide the Authority with a copy of the Notice of Completion shall entitle the Authority to pursue all remedies available to it under the DDA and any applicable law, and to terminate the DDA without incurring any liability whatsoever to Developer.

<u>Further Amendments to the DDA</u>. Commencing on August 1, 2023, provided the PRV Facility is completed as set forth in the Fourth Amendment and the DDA is not otherwise terminated, the Parties agreed to meet and confer in good faith to discuss further amendments to the DDA with the goal of executing an amended and restated DDA not later than October 3, 2024 (which is commensurate with the date that the construction of Exhibit D-II horizontal improvements must be completed, per the Second Amendment). Developer agreed to reimburse the Authority for all fees and costs associated with such efforts, including legal and engineering fees and costs, within 30 days of the date Authority submits an invoice to Developer, and failure to reimburse the Authority for such costs will be a default under the DDA. The Parties agreed that nothing contained in the Amendment shall be interpreted in any way to alter the requirement that Developer must complete, or cause to be completed, the construction of the Exhibit D-II horizontal improvements by October 3, 2024.

#### Fifth Amendment

On July 31, 2023, the Developer did not deliver to the Authority a Notice of Completion from Western. However, the PRV facility was substantially completed within 60-days of the deadline with a Notice of Substantial Completion issued by Western on October 30, 2023.

On February 14, 2024, the Authority approved a Fifth Amendment to clarify that the PRV Facility was deemed substantially completed ("**Clarification**") and to amend the Developer's obligations with respect to the construction of two Cactus Channel crossings ("**Amendment**") so as to align those crossings with the future design, to be done by others, for the Cactus Channel.

The Developer agreed to pay into an escrow account under Authority's control ("Escrow Account") the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000.00) to cover the cost of construction of the Crossings and a portion of the Authority's contribution toward the completion of the Cactus Channel. Said sum shall be paid to the Escrow Account in installments as follows: (1) five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) on or before July 1, 2024; (2) one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) on or before July 1, 2025; and (3) one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) on or before July 1, 2026. Additional conditions pertaining to the escrow account and any storm drain credit are outlined within the Fifth Amendment.

Additionally, the Developer desired to develop the SCE Substation at a location that differs from the location originally contemplated in Exhibit D-II of the DDA ("SCE Substation Relocation"). Developer represented that the change in location is beneficial to the Project and that Developer possesses the experience necessary to develop the SCE Substation (at either location) and coordinate with Southern California Edison on completing said development, in satisfaction of Developer's obligations under Exhibit D-II of the DDA.

The Clarification and Amendment was intended to facilitate the continued development of the LifeCare Campus project in a way that would increase funds to the taxing entities and do not extend the outside deadline to complete the overall project.

Since the execution of the Fifth Amendment, JPA was informed by the applicant that a substation would not be constructed by the October 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2024. This item is scheduled for a Joint Powers Commission closed session discussion on September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2024.

## Fifth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement (DDA)

Authority: March Joint Powers Authority Developer: March1 LLC

#### FIFTH AMENDMENT TO MARCH LIFECARE CAMPUS DISPOSITION AND DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

This **FIFTH AMENDMENT TO MARCH LIFECARE CAMPUS DISPOSITION AND DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT** ("**Fifth Amendment**") is entered into by and between MARCH JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY, a California joint powers authority ("**Authority**"), as successor-in-interest to the March Joint Powers Redevelopment Agency; and MARCH1 LLC, a California limited liability company ("**Developer**"), as successor-in-interest to March Healthcare Development, LLC, a California limited liability company. Authority and Developer are sometimes referred to, individually, in this Fifth Amendment as a "**Party**" and, collectively, as the "**Parties**."

This Fifth Amendment is entered into by the Parties based upon the facts and circumstances set forth in the following Recitals.

#### RECITALS

A. The March Joint Powers Redevelopment Agency, a California public agency ("Agency"), and March Healthcare Development, LLC, a California limited liability company ("MHD"), entered into that certain March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement dated April 7, 2010 (the "Original Agreement"), as amended by that certain "First Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of March 7, 2012 ("First Amendment"), as amended by that certain "Second Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of September 29, 2018 ("Second Amendment"), as amended by that certain Third Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of January 26, 2022 ("Third Amendment"), as amended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of January 26, 2022 ("Third Amendment"), as amended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of January 26, 2022 ("Third Amendment"), as amended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated as of January 26, 2022 ("Third Amendment"), as amended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," as an ended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," as amended by that "Fourth Amendment to March LifeCare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," as an ended by that "Fourth Amendment"). As used herein, the term "DDA" means the Original Agreement, as amended.

B. Authority is the successor-in-interest to Agency, pursuant to that certain "Assignment and Assumption of March Lifecare Campus Disposition and Development Agreement," dated March 2, 2011, a memorandum of which is recorded in the Official Records of the County of Riverside as Document No. 2011-0107853.

C. On January 22, 2016, MHD assigned its rights in and to the DDA to Developer, an affiliate of MHD.

D. The DDA, among other things, requires Developer to complete the PRV Facility (as described in Section 4(i)(1) of the Third Amendment) by July 31, 2023 ("**PRV Completion Date**"), which completion is to be evidenced by the issuance of a notice of completion ("**Notice of Completion**") by Western Municipal Water District ("**Western**"), subject only to punch list items.

E. Developer claims, and Authority disputes whether Developer completed the PRV Facility by the PRV Completion Date.

F. Authority and Developer desire by this Fifth Amendment to clarify that the PRV Facility is now deemed substantially completed ("**Clarification**") and to amend the Developer's obligations with respect to the construction of two Cactus Channel crossings ("**Crossings Amendment**") so as to align those crossings with the future design, to be done by others, for the Cactus Channel.

G. Additionally, Developer desires to develop the SCE Substation at a location that differs from the location originally contemplated in Exhibit D-II of the DDA ("SCE Substation Relocation"). Developer represents that the change in location is beneficial to the Project and that Developer possesses the experience necessary to develop the SCE Substation (at either location) and to coordinate with Southern California Edison on completing said development, in satisfaction of Developer's obligations under Exhibit D-II of the DDA.

H. The Clarification and Crossings Amendment would facilitate the continued development of the LifeCare Campus project in a way that would increase funds to the taxing entities and do not extend the outside deadline to complete the overall project.

I. The Clarification and Crossings Amendment are not actions requiring approval of the Oversight Board of the Agency under Section 34180 of the California Health & Safety Code, and as such, the Authority is authorized to enter into this Fifth Amendment in its capacity as the assignee to the Agency's rights and obligations under Section 6.03 of the DDA.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, and for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

#### **OPERATIVE PROVISIONS**

1. <u>Recitals Incorporated</u>. The above Recitals are incorporated herein and made a part of this Fifth Amendment by this reference.

2. <u>Effect Upon DDA</u>. The Parties ratify and reaffirm each and every one of their rights and obligations as set forth in the DDA. All initially capitalized terms used but not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings ascribed to such terms in the DDA. From and after this Fifth Amendment's Effective Date, wherever the term "Agreement" appears in the DDA and its exhibits, it will be read and understood to mean the DDA as modified by this Fifth Amendment. Except as so expressly modified, all other terms, conditions and requirements of the DDA and its exhibits remain unchanged and in full force and effect.

3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Fifth Amendment shall become effective on the date which it has been approved and executed by the respective authorized representative(s) of the Parties ("**Effective Date**").

4. <u>Clarification Regarding Completion of the PRV Facility</u>. The Authority and Developer hereby acknowledge that the PRV Facility is now substantially complete, as evidenced by the Notice of Substantial Completion issued by Western on October 30, 2023. Authority hereby agrees to waive any and all remedies associated with any alleged failure on the part of Developer

to complete the PRV Facility by the PRV Completion Date, subject to the terms and conditions contained in this Fifth Amendment.

Amendment of Cactus Channel Crossings Obligations. Under the DDA, the 5. Developer is presently required to, among other things: (1) complete construction of a Cactus Avenue Channel Crossing at Riverside Drive on or before October 3, 2024 as shown on Exhibit D-II of the DDA (the "Cactus/Riverside Channel Crossing"); (2) commence construction of a Cactus Avenue Channel Crossing at March Lifecare Drive on or before October 3, 2027 as shown on Exhibit D-III of the DDA (the "Cactus/March Lifecare Channel Crossing", and together with the Cactus/Riverside Channel Crossing, the "Crossings"); (3) complete construction of a traffic signal at the intersection of Cactus Avenue and Riverside Drive on or before October 3, 2024 as shown on Exhibit D-II of the DDA ("Traffic Signal"); and (4) complete construction of the SCE Substation on or before October 3, 2024 as shown on Exhibit D-II of the DDA. Developer and Authority agree, in lieu of completing the Crossings, Developer shall pay into an escrow account under Authority's control ("Escrow Account") the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000.00) ("In Lieu Funds"), in the manner described in Paragraph 6 below, to cover the cost of construction of the Crossings and a portion of the Authority's contribution toward the completion of the Cactus Channel. Developer's obligations to complete construction of the Traffic Signal and SCE Substation under the DDA remain unchanged.

Use of Escrow Account. Developer shall deposit the In Lieu Funds into the Escrow 6. Account in installments as follows: (1) five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) on or before July 1, 2024; (2) one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) on or before July 1, 2025; and (3) one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) on or before July 1, 2026. The In Lieu Funds may be used only for the purposes of meeting any contribution obligation of the Authority to the cost of the construction of the Cactus Channel, and may include the cost of constructing the Crossings required to be constructed by Developer under the DDA (as noted in Paragraph 5 above); provided, however, in the event the Crossings are not completed by the time Developer reaches a threshold in the Project whereby at least one of the Crossings is both (a) unfinished and (b) a necessary Project milestone, then, and so long as Developer is not otherwise in default under the DDA, Developer will be entitled to reimbursement out of the Escrow Account up to a maximum amount of one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) ("Reimbursable Funds") towards Developer's completion of that necessary and unfinished portion of the Crossings. Disbursement of any Reimbursable Funds payable to Developer shall be issued to Developer within 30 days of Authority's receipt from Developer of a written request for reimbursement accompanied by reasonable documentation and copies of receipts in support of the amount requested. Any work on the Crossings by Developer shall be in a manner consistent with the then standards and requirements provided by the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District ("Flood Control") for the Crossings and the completion of any such work by Developer is subject to Flood Control's final sign off. In no event shall the Authority be obligated to (x) deposit any funds into the Escrow Account, or (y) use its own monies to reimburse Developer for costs incurred by Developer related to the Crossings.

7. <u>Storm Drain Credit</u>. Provided Developer is not in default under the DDA, Developer shall receive a dollar-for-dollar credit against any storm drain fees assessed by the Authority against Developer or any purchaser of land from Developer in an amount equal to fifty percent (50%) of the payments made by it into the Escrow Account under this Fifth Amendment.

SCE Substation Relocation. Developer understands that the proposed relocation of 8. the SCE Substation may require Developer to obtain further governmental and other approvals and conduct environmental studies, including without limitation in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act. Developer hereby agrees to reimburse the Authority within 30 days of receiving an invoice from the Authority for all third-party costs and fees (including Attorneys' fees) incurred by the Authority related to the proposed SCE Substation Relocation. Except as expressly specified in Paragraph 5 above, Developer and Authority understand and agree that no part of this Paragraph 8 or this Fifth Amendment is intended to alter, nor does it in any way whatsoever alter, Developer's construction obligations under Exhibit D-II, including without limitation, completion of the SCE Substation by the October 3, 2024, deadline set forth in Exhibit D-II. Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary contained in this Fifth Amendment or the DDA, Developer hereby waives the right to assert the existence of any force majeure event in connection with the completion of the SCE Substation, including without limitation events related to the approvals, environmental studies related to the proposed relocation of the SCE Substation described herein.

No Other Modification. Except as modified herein, all other terms of the DDA, 9. including without limitation, the remainder of Exhibit D, the Parties' agreement to meet and confer in good faith regarding an amended and restated DDA with the goal of executing such amended and restated DDA not later than October 3, 2024, and payment by Developer of any costs and fees payable by Developer to Authority, remain unchanged and in full force and effect. For the avoidance of doubt, unless and until the Parties execute an amended and restated DDA, the Parties' rights and obligations under the DDA (as herein amended) remain unchanged and in full force and effect. Failure of Developer to meet any of the deadlines set forth in Exhibit D (as amended) or to make the payments in Paragraphs 5 and 8 to Authority when due shall be deemed a default under the DDA entitling Authority to all remedies available to it under the DDA and any applicable law, or to terminate the DDA at its sole option without incurring any liability whatsoever to Developer. Developer hereby waives the right to assert the existence of any reasonably foreseeable force majeure event that Developer is or should be presently aware of. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the force majeure provision contained in the DDA shall remain in effect as to new and unforeseeable qualifying force majeure events arising after the Effective Date of this Fifth Amendment.

10. <u>Time of the Essence</u>. Time is of the essence with respect to the Parties' performance of each and every obligation set forth herein.

11. <u>Memorandum of Agreement</u>. A Memorandum of this Fifth Amendment shall be recorded in the Official Records of the County of Riverside in a form reasonably acceptable to the Parties within 10 days of the Effective Date.





#### **Background**:

On April 28, 2021, the Commission authorized the March Inland Port Airport Authority's (MIPAA) FAA submittal for an Airport Master Plan. The master plan project would allow MIPAA to establish a 20-year plan for the buildout of the airport. The plan would include an update to the current Airport Layout Plan and update the airport capital improvement program. Marc Champigny with C&S Engineering will present the master plan and provide a report on the status of planning activities and next steps on completing required FAA submittals. This item appeared before the Airport Land Use Study Committee on Wednesday, May 1st and then before the TAC on May 6, 2024. At that time the MJPA team was waiting for input from the March Air Reserve Base.

On June 24, 2024, staff received comments from the base on preferred new taxiway connections to the main Runway 14/32. Those changes have been incorporated into the new Master Plan which was presented to the Commission at their August 14th meeting for consideration. The Commission desired to have further discussions with the base in August to ensure that all comments pertaining to the master plan were addressed. Staff received confirmation in August that the base has no further comments. The plan is rescheduled for the Commission's consideration at their September 11th meeting. The airport master plan and updated ALP will be submitted to the FAA soon thereafter.




The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has completed the review of the Aviation Activity Forecast – Section 4, Forecasts of Demand for March ARB Airport dated November 2022. The RIV Preferred Operations Forecast, Industry Growth/Cargo High Growth/New Airline Entrant projected activity growth at eight percent, and follows with the 10 to 20 years of the planning period of four percent and fall within the standard TAF tolerance of 10 percent and 15 percent within the 5 and 10-year planning periods.

However, the TAF has not been updated to reflect the current estimated base line operations at the airport and standard TAF procedures is to flat line forecasts at some general aviation airports. Your preferred forecast as submitted is approved for airport planning purposes including Airport Layout Plan (ALP) development.


This forecast was prepared at the same time as the evolving impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency. Forecast approval is based on the methodology, data, and conclusions at the time the document was prepared. However, consideration of the impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency on aviation activity is warranted to acknowledge the reduced confidence in growth projections using currently-available data.

Accordingly, FAA approval of this forecast does not constitute justification for future projects. Justification for future projects will be made based on activity levels at the time the project is requested for development. Documentation of actual activity levels meeting planning activity levels will be necessary to justify AIP funding for eligible projects.









#### **Background**:

On December 13, 2023, the Commission of the March Inland Port Airport Authority (MIPAA) approved an updated 5-year Airport Capital Improvement Plan (ACIP) consistent with FAA funding criteria. The ACIP included phases of the FAA approved Pavement Management Plan (PMP) for MIPAA. The attached scope of work by MIPAA engineer, C&S Companies, is to assist in the design, bidding and awarding for the AP-5 Crack Seal Rehabilitation Project.

The project scope generally consists of the joint and crack repair of the apron pavement identified in the Pavement Management Program as area "AP-5". This area is in the northeastern corner of the existing cargo apron that is showing signs of pavement fatigue and cracking. The proposed project will address the cracking and routing and sealing of all the cracks, as well as completing isolated pavement repairs for spalled concrete patches. The project repair area is proposed at 50' x 350'. This project is proposed to be completed in a single phase. No expansion of pavement surface is proposed.

The attached site plan identifies the proposed work area in pink and the staging area in green. Currently, this area serves as storage for Amazon Air. Additionally, no aircraft park on this portion of the apron.



#### <u>NEPA</u>

A Categorical Exclusion was submitted to analyze all environmental impacts associated with the project and on June 20, 2024, the FAA approved the CatEx pursuant to FAA Order 1050.1F.

#### CEQA:

The project is categorically exempt from CEQA under the existing facilities exemption, CEQA Guidelines section 15301(d). The existing facilities exemption applies to the restoration or rehabilitation of damaged or deteriorated facilities so long as there is no expansion of use. The

project proposes rehabilitation of the existing cargo apron and does not involve any expansion of its current operational use.

None of the exceptions to the use of a categorical exemption identified in CEQA Guidelines section 15300.2 apply here. No significant cumulative impacts would result from the proposed project. Nor is there any reasonable possibility that the project will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances, because no unusual circumstances are presented. The project is not located on a scenic highway and will not damage any scenic or historic resources. Finally, the project is not located on a hazardous waste site identified in the Cortese list.

#### Funding:

The scope of work is proposed at approximately \$43,000 to be covered by FAA entitlement funds for MIPAA. The sponsor (MIPAA) would contribute \$23,810 toward the design, bidding and awarding of the project.

#### Schedule:

The final design plans are complete, and bidding is slated for December 2024. At a future date, staff will bring back an action item requesting authorization to advertise for a Request for Proposals.

#### **SCHEDULE A – Scope of Work**

Dear Dr. Martin:

C&S Engineers, Inc. (C&S/Consultant) is pleased to submit this proposal to provide professional engineering services for the March Joint Powers Authority (MJPA/Sponsor) to design an pavement crack seal rehabilitation at the March Reserve Air Base Airport (RIV) located in the City of Riverside, Riverside County, California.

We propose to provide the services described herein.

#### **Project Description:**

Currently, portions of the concrete surface of March Inland Port Airport's designated apron need treatment. The longitudinal and transverse concrete panel has been cracking and has appeared throughout the pavement and is rapidly deteriorating.

The proposed pavement crack sealing will be able to maintain the pavement integrity and extend the service life of the pavement. All newly sealed areas and newly constructed areas will be re-stripped, following adequate cure time of the preservative seal. The proposed project will consist of approximately 17,500 SF of the apron (see Attachment A) and will result in approximately 1,000 linear feet of cracking.

#### **Scope of Services**

For this project, we anticipate the involvement of the following disciplines:

#### **ADMINISTRATION PHASE**

4. Coordinate and schedule Progress Project Meeting with Sponsor.

#### SCHEMATIC DESIGN PHASE (30%)

The Schematic Design Phase is intended to identify and evaluate alternatives to provide cost-effective and practical solutions for the work items identified. The CONSULTANT will evaluate alternatives through contacts with local authorities, field investigations, and a practical design approach. The Project's design will take advantage of local knowledge and experience and will utilize expertise from recent construction projects in an effort to design a cost-effective Project. The specific services to be provided or furnished for this Phase of the Project are the following:

- 1. Schedule and conduct a pre-design meeting with the SPONSOR to review the scope of services and become familiar with the Project requirements and operational concerns during the Project's construction.
- 2. Acquire and review record documents (such as plans, specifications, reports, and studies) to become familiar with data that is available for the Project.
- 3. Perform a preliminary Project site inspection to further familiarize the design team with Project areas.
- 4. Prepare preliminary plans identifying required topographic field surveys and other field investigative programs. Coordinate schedule with SPONSOR and supervise programs at the Project site as necessary.
- 5. Acquire the necessary topographic survey of and utility data for, the Project site, including related office computations and drafting.
- 6. Prepare preliminary opinion of probable construction costs for each major element of the Project.
- 7. Develop a draft construction safety phasing plan (CSPP) that endeavors to limit interference by the Project's construction with airport and tenant operations.
- 8. Submit schematic design to the sponsor for their review.
- 9. Schedule and conduct a schematic design review meeting with the SPONSOR to review the schematic design.

#### PRELIMINARY DESIGN (90%)

The services to be performed during this Phase consist generally of services required to furnish the SPONSOR with a set of Preliminary Plans, Specifications, and Engineer's Report.



# 85th Annual Report of the **Foreign-Trade Zones Board** to the Congress of the United States

#### U.S. FOREIGN-TRADE ZONES

Foreign-trade zones are secure areas under supervision of U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) that are considered outside the customs territory of the United States for the purposes of duty payment. Located in or near customs ports of entry, they are the U.S. version of what are known internationally as free trade zones. Authority for establishing these facilities is granted by the Foreign-Trade Zones (FTZ) Board under the Foreign-Trade Zones Act of 1934, as amended (19 U.S.C. §§81a-81u), and the Board's regulations (15 C.F.R. Part 400). The Executive Secretariat of the Board is located within Enforcement and Compliance of the U.S. Department of Commerce in Washington, D.C.

Foreign and domestic merchandise may, subject to FTZ Board and CBP regulations, be moved into zones for operations not otherwise prohibited by law involving storage, exhibition, assembly, manufacturing, and processing. All zone activity is subject to public interest review, and all production activity requires a case-by-case review. Under zone procedures, the usual formal customs entry procedure and payment of duties are not required on the foreign merchandise unless and until it enters customs territory for domestic consumption, in which case the importer may have a choice of paying duties either on the original foreign materials or the finished product. Domestic goods moved into a zone for export are considered exported upon entering the zone for purposes of excise tax rebates and drawback. The benefits obtained through FTZ procedures help encourage U.S. activity, employment and value added, often in competition with foreign alternatives. FTZ sites and activities remain within the jurisdiction of federal, state and local governments and agencies.

A foreign-trade zone is created when a local organization, such as a city, county or port authority, applies to the FTZ Board for a grant to establish and operate a zone to serve a specifically defined geographic area. Upon approval of the zone by the FTZ Board, the organization becomes known as the FTZ "grantee". Grantees are then able to submit applications to the FTZ Board to establish FTZ sites or subzones for use by companies in that area. Under the FTZ Act, grantees are required to operate their zones as "public utilities" and provide "uniform treatment under like conditions" to companies using the zone.

The regulations of the Foreign-Trade Zones Board are published in the Code of Federal Regulations at Title 15, Part 400 (15 C.F.R. Part 400), and the regulations of U.S. Customs and Border Protection concerning zones are published in the Code of Federal Regulations at Title 19, Part 146 (19 C.F.R. Part 146). 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#### INTRODUCTION

This document constitutes the report of the Foreign-Trade Zones (FTZ) Board to the Congress of the United States pursuant to 19 U.S.C. §81p(c). Unless otherwise noted, the data contained in this report pertains to FTZ activity during the 2023 calendar year.

During the year, the FTZ Board received and docketed 66 requests, and issued 73 decisions. The FTZ Board's decisions included the reorganization or expansion of nine zones under the alternative site framework (ASF), as well as decisions on 55 applications and notifications for new or expanded production authority. Under delegated authority, the FTZ Board Staff processed an additional 250 requests that primarily included minor boundary modifications.

There were 200 FTZs active during the year, with a total of 374 active production operations. Over 550,000 persons were employed within 1,300 active FTZ operations during the year. The value of shipments into zones totaled nearly \$949 billion, compared with \$1,011 billion the previous year (Appendix A). About 68 percent of the shipments received at zones involved domestic status merchandise. The levels of domestic status merchandise used by FTZ operations – 80% for production operations and 48% for warehouse/distribution operations – indicates that FTZ activity tends to involve domestic operations that include significant domestic inputs alongside foreign inputs.


Warehouse/distribution operations received nearly \$364 billion in merchandise while production operations received nearly \$585 billion (62 percent of zone activity). The largest industries accounting for zone production activity include the pharmaceutical, oil refining, automotive, electronics, and machinery/equipment sectors. The main foreign-origin products received at zones are listed in Appendix B.

Exports (shipments to foreign countries) from facilities operating under FTZ procedures amounted to nearly \$149 billion (Appendix A). The export figures do not include certain indirect exports involving FTZ merchandise that undergoes further processing in the United States at non-FTZ sites prior to export.

Appendix C contains lists of the Top 25 zones and states for FTZ merchandise received and exported during the year. In addition, information on FTZ activity by state, as well as within each zone, is available in Appendix D.<sup>1</sup>

In addition, the website contains contact information for each zone, a summary of all Board Orders, lists of Staff-level cases and other reference materials.

\* "Domestic status merchandise" includes both domestic-origin items and foreign-origin items that have been entered for consumption (duty-paid) prior to FTZ admission.





Figure 2: Exports (2003-2023)





Figure 4: Employment in FTZs by Year (2014-2023)

### TOP FOREIGN-STATUS PRODUCTS BY VALUE





Report/Discussion: March Joint Use Airport Operations Update

#### **Background:**

This item is provided as an update for the Technical Advisory Committee.

On August 15, 2024, JPA Commission Chair Delgado, Vice Chair Vargas, former Chair Conder and the Chief Executive Officer met with the 452<sup>nd</sup> Wing Deputy Commander, Colonel Oberoi, and his staff, to better understand and address any concerns that the Base may have on the JPA and our airport's civil operations.

The meeting with Commissioners and Base leadership, as well as follow-up discussions, was very positive. Base leadership expressed their gratitude for our partnership and shared their support for continued Joint Use. There were also high-level discussions regarding mission sustainment, cost-sharing for flying facilities and civil operations. Following is a summary of those communications:

<u>Mission Sustainment</u>: These meetings emphasized the importance (from both the base leadership and JPA) of sustaining military missions at March and the JPA's continued efforts to support and protect MARB. Colonel Oberoi acknowledged the importance of our partnership with them and JPA Commissioners emphasized the JPA's continued support of MARB and our commitment to the protection of military missions.

<u>Cost Sharing</u>: The Base will be sending MIPAA a letter with an invoice regarding MIPAA's proportionate share of flying facilities maintenance costs. The invoice will include prior year costs which will help address Base concerns that they have not billed MIPAA for our "fair share" of flying facilities maintenance costs in past years. Sharing in flying facilities maintenance costs is within our current Joint Use Agreement (JUA, 2014, Section 8). Depending on the invoice amount for retroactive costs, we will make arrangements to come up with a payment schedule for the Commission's consideration and approval. I hope to bring something to you in the very near future from the Base.

The Base also desires to update the cost sharing formula in the JUA. Headquarters Air Force (HAF), a.k.a. "Big Air Force", is looking at standardizing the cost sharing formula in all JUAs to a "percentage share" formula where the civilian airport's contribution to flying facilities maintenance costs is proportionate to their number of operations at the airport. This would increase MIPAA's payments to the Base. Base leadership also wants to add a separate charge

that is based on increased landing fees. This would be an additional charge and Base staff is reviewing this option against Air Force regulations and will share details to discuss at a future time.

<u>Civil Operations</u>: Base leadership is comfortable with maintaining 21,000 operations per the JUA as long as big Air Force supports a local agreement that would help manage our annual civilian operations. An idea that was discussed is that we would meet annually to review civil operations and flying facility capacities and mitigate or adjust accordingly. The JUA does allow MARB and MIPAA to enter into local agreements for managing flying facilities and the base team is working through their process to verify that the desired plan is in compliance with regulations.

The Wing Commander will be present at the September 11<sup>th</sup> Commission meeting to reiterate the Base's partnership efforts with the JPA and March Inland Port Airport, and following the meeting the Commission will have further discussions on joint use in closed session.

#### JOINT USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN

#### THE MARCH INLAND PORT AIRPORT AUTHORITY

AND

#### THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

This Joint Use Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this  $\cancel{19}$  day of 2014, by and between the Secretary of the Air Force, for and on behalf of the United States of America ("Air Force) and the March Inland Port Airport Authority ("March IPAA"), a California Airport Authority under the governance of March Joint Powers Authority (March JPA) a unit of general local government in the State of California which is authorized to act as a joint powers authority , and which consists of the City of Moreno Valley, the City of Perris, the City of Riverside, and the County of Riverside.

WHEREAS, the Air Force owns and operates the runway and associated flight facilities (collectively "Flying Facilities") located at March Air Reserve Base, California ("MARB"); and

WHEREAS, the March IPAA was formed by the March JPA in 1996 for the purpose of creating a new civilian joint use airport in cooperation with the Air Force; and

WHEREAS, the March IPAA operates the civilian joint use airport on behalf of March JPA.

WHEREAS, the March IPAA desires to use the Flying Facilities at MARB for civil operations which are to operate jointly with military aircraft; and

WHEREAS, the Air Force considers that this Agreement will be in the public interest, and is agreeable to joint use of the Flying Facilities at MARB; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement neither addresses nor commits any Air Force real property or other facilities that may be required for exclusive use by the March JPA and/or the March IPAA to support either present or future civil aircraft operations and activities arising out of or in connection with joint use; and

WHEREAS, the Air Force and the March JPA entered into the initial Joint Use Agreement between the March Joint Powers Authority and the United States Air Force on May 7, 1997 (the "Joint Use Agreement"), which was amended by the Amendment 1 to the Joint Use Agreement on February 21, 2001 ("Amendment 1"), and by the Amendment 2 to the Joint Use Agreement on June 20, 2008 ("Amendment 2"); and

WHEREAS, this Agreement has incorporated all of the changes previously approved in Amendment 1 and Amendment 2.

WHEREAS, the Air Force has approved the March JPA's request to assign all of its rights and interest under the Joint Use Agreement dated May 7, 1997, as amended to the March IPAA and;

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to modify Sections 1(c), 4(a), 8(a) and (b), and 11.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed by the Air Force and the March IPAA:

#### 1. <u>CIVIL AIRCRAFT OPERATIONS</u>

a. The Air Force hereby authorizes the March IPAA to permit civil aircraft equipped with two-way radios capable of communicating with the MARB Control Tower to use the Flying Facilities at MARB, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement and those Federal Aviation Regulations (FARs) applicable to civil aircraft operations. For purposes of this Agreement, the jointly used flying facilities are the runways,

taxiways, lighting systems, navigational aids, markings, and appurtenances located on MARB and open to public use as depicted on Exhibit A ("Jointly Used Flying Facilities").

b. Prior to conducting any civil aircraft operations under this Agreement, the March IPAA will directly, or by contract with a fixed base operator, provide and operate at no cost to the Air Force, all facilities necessary to support the civil aircraft operations authorized under this Agreement. This includes but is not limited to aircraft parking and tiedown, aircraft fueling, and parking for privately-owned vehicles.

c. March IPAA is limited to 21,000 annual civil aircraft operations. Further environmental review may be required if civil aircraft operations exceed these limits. An operation is a landing or a takeoff.

d. Civil aircraft using the Jointly Used Flying Facilities on official government business as provided in Air Force Instruction (AFI) 10-1001, *Civil Aircraft Landing Permits*, are not subject to this Agreement and shall not otherwise count as a civil aircraft landing or take-off for purposes of this Agreement.

e. Civil aircraft using the Jointly Used Flying Facilities under the authority of this Agreement shall be entitled use for landings, take-offs, and ground movements of aircraft and will park only in areas owned by the March JPA or leased from the Air Force and designated for that purpose. Civil and military aircraft on official government business shall have unobstructed access to any portions of the taxiway that may be within the boundary of properties leased from the Air Force by the March JPA.

f. The distance between the hot cargo pad and runway 30/12 does not meet separation requirements; therefore, civil aircraft use of the runway will be suspended when the hot cargo pad on MARB is in use. The MARB Airfield Manager will provide the March IPAA with advance notice of operations scheduled for the hot cargo pad.

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g. All ground and air movements of civil aircraft using the Jointly Used Flying Facilities under this Agreement, and movement of all vehicles operating on the airfield in areas other than the March JPA ramp, will be controlled by the MARB Control Tower. Military operations at March ARB shall be afforded priority over all other aircraft except emergencies.

h. Civil aircraft activity will coincide with the MARB Control Tower hours of operation. The Air Force will try to accommodate any requests from the March IPAA for additional hours for the MARB Control Tower or other essential airfield management services which the March IPAA may require beyond those needed by the Air Force. Any additional hours of the MARB Control Tower or other essential airfield management or operational requirements beyond those needed by the Air Force, shall be arranged and funded (or reimbursed) by March IPAA. These charges, if any, shall be in addition to the annual charge in paragraph 8(a) and payable not less frequently than quarterly.

i. No civil aircraft may use the Jointly Used Flying Facilities for student pilot training.

#### 2. MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION

a. The Air Force is responsible for maintaining and repairing the Jointly Used Flying Facilities to support the military mission. The runway and apron, including any airfield pavements, lighting systems, and/or markings, are made available for use on an "as is, where is" basis. Nothing herein shall be construed to require the Air Force to improve existing facilities to accommodate civil aircraft using MARB pursuant to this Agreement.

Maintenance, resurfacing, and repairs of pavement owned by the March
 JPA and/or March IPAA as depicted in Exhibit A, shall be the responsibility of the March
 IPAA.

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c. Dust or any other erosion or nuisance that is created by, or arises out of, activities or operations by civil aircraft authorized use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities under this Agreement will be corrected by the March IPAA at no expense to the Air Force, using standard Air Force engineering methods and procedures.

d. Every effort will be made by the Air Force to perform runway maintenance with minimal interruption to civil aircraft operations. However, the Air Force reserves the right to temporarily suspend civil aircraft operations when required for runway maintenance. Except for emergency situations, the Air Force will notify the March IPAA at least five (5) days in advance of such temporary interruption. The Air Force will not be responsible for any lost revenues for such interruptions.

e. The current level of maintenance and operation of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities maintained by the Air Force at MARB for military operations and activities is adequate to support military operations. Any changes required to support civil aircraft operations must be at no expense to the Air Force and requires Air Force concurrence, which may be withheld at its sole discretion.

f. To ensure compliance with distance and height standards for structures adjacent to the runway, coordination with the MARB Base Civil Engineer and MARB Airfield Manager is required for planning and construction of new structures or exterior alteration of existing structures located on MARB that the March JPA may lease from the Air Force or on the March JPA leased or owned properties.

g. The March IPAA shall not post any notices or erect any billboards or signs, nor authorize the posting of any notices or the erection of any billboards or signs, at the Jointly Used Flying Facilities of any nature whatsoever, other than identification signs attached to buildings, without prior written approval from the MARB Base Civil Engineer.

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#### 3. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS</u>

a. The March IPAA shall at all times during the existence of this Agreement promptly observe and comply, at its sole cost and expense, with the provisions of all Federal, State, and local laws, rules, regulations, orders, ordinances, and other governmental standards and requirements which may be applicable to the March IPAA's use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities for civil aircraft operations and its activities under or pursuant to this Agreement, and particularly those provisions concerning the protection of the environment, pollution control and abatement, and occupational safety and health, whether the same now are in force, or that may at any time in the future be enacted or directed.

b. The March IPAA shall comply with all applicable State and local laws, ordinances, and regulations with regard to licenses or permits to do business and all other matters.

c. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to constitute a waiver of Federal supremacy or Federal sovereign immunity.

d. Responsibility for compliance as specified in this paragraph rests exclusively with the March IPAA. The Air Force assumes no enforcement or supervisory responsibility except with respect to matters committed to its jurisdiction and authority. The March IPAA shall be liable for all costs associated with compliance, defense of enforcement actions or suits, payment of fines, penalties, or other sanctions and remedial costs related to the March IPAA's use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities and its activities under or pursuant to this Agreement.

#### 4. <u>AIR QUALITY AND NOISE RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

a. Air Quality. The March IPAA shall comply with the procedural and programmatic requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act and all State, Regional, and local

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regulations related to clean air. This shall include, but not be limited to, any requirements to complete an "air quality conformity" analysis, the results and conditions of which shall be binding on the March IPAA and its commercial tenants. The March IPAA shall provide a certified statement of its emission levels annually to the Commander, 452 AMW commencing on December 31, 2014.

b. Noise. The March IPAA shall implement any civil aircraft noise mitigation plans associated with use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities, at no expense to the Air Force, pursuant to the requirements of the MARB Air Installation Compatible Use Zone (AICUZ) study as it presently exists or may be updated in the future; and environmental impact statements and environmental assessments, including supplements, applicable to aircraft operations at MARB.

#### 5. <u>SECURITY</u>

a. Authority under the provisions of the Internal Security Act of 1950 in restricting or prohibiting an individual access to MARB may be exercised by the installation commander. The March IPAA shall comply, at no expense to the Air Force, with all applicable Federal Aviation Administration and Transportation Security Administration security measures and procedures associated with civil aircraft use as described in the Airport Security Program for MARB.

b. Access to the MARB flight line for privately-owned vehicles will be limited to those required to support civil aircraft operations. The March IPAA will be responsible for coordinating with the MARB Airfield Manager to develop procedures consistent with Air Force Instruction 13-213 *Airfield Driving*, that will limit privately-owned vehicles to aircraft movement areas and parking aprons and ensure that individuals are certified to drive on the MARB flightline. March IPAA employees, its commercial tenants,

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customers, and guests are responsible for following MARB flightline driving rules. The Air Force must be reimbursed if it provides the training required for certification.

#### 6. **GROUND HANDLING AND SERVICES**

a. The March IPAA shall be responsible, when necessary, for providing services (including fueling), maintenance, and emergency repairs for civil aircraft authorized to use the Jointly Used Flying Facilities under this Agreement at no cost to the Air Force. The March IPAA shall comply with FAA standards in controlling materials and equipment used in such services so as to prevent aircraft foreign object damage.

b. If Air Force assistance is provided to repair a civil aircraft, the March
 IPAA shall reimburse the Air Force for all expenses of such services.

#### 7. FIRE PROTECTION AND CRASH RESCUE

a. The Air Force maintains the level of fire fighting and crash and rescue capability required to support the military mission at MARB. The Air Force agrees to respond to fire and crash and rescue emergencies on the March JPA owned or leased property involving civil aircraft outside the hangars or other structures within the limits of its capabilities, equipment, and available personnel, at the request of the March IPAA, and subject to subparagraphs b, c, and d below. Air Force fire fighting and crash and rescue equipment and personnel shall not be routinely located in the airfield movement area during non-emergency landings by civil aircraft.

b. Excluding fire fighting and crash and rescue equipment and related personnel, the March IPAA shall be responsible for installing, operating, and maintaining, at no cost to the Air Force, the equipment and safety devices required for all aspects of handling and support for aircraft on the ground, as specified in the Federal Aviation Regulations (FARs) and National Fire Protection Association procedures and standards.

c. The March IPAA agrees to release, acquit, and forever discharge the Air Force, its officers, agents, contractors, and employees from all liability arising out of or connected with the use of or failure to supply in individual cases, Air Force fire fighting and/or crash and rescue equipment or personnel for fire control and crash and rescue activities pursuant to this Agreement. The March IPAA further agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Air Force, its officers, agents, contractors, and employees against any and all claims, of whatever description, arising out of or connected with such use of, or failure to supply, in individual cases Air Force fire fighting and/or crash and rescue equipment or personnel.

d. The March IPAA will reimburse the Air Force for all documented expenses incurred by the Air Force for fire fighting and/or crash services, spill response services, and rescue materials expended in connection with providing such services to civil aircraft. If mission essential, the Air Force may, at its option, with concurrence of the National Transportation Safety Board, remove damaged civil aircraft and associated debris from Air Force-owned pavements or property and shall follow existing Air Force directives and/or instructions in recovering the cost of such removal.

e. Failure to comply with the above conditions, upon reasonable notice to cure or upon termination of this Agreement under the provisions of paragraph 12, may result in termination of fire protection and crash and rescue response by the Air Force.

f. The Air Force commitment to assist the March IPAA with fire protection shall continue only so long as a fire fighting and crash and rescue organization is authorized for military operations at MARB. The Air Force shall have no obligation to maintain or provide a fire fighting and crash and rescue organization or fire fighting and crash and rescue equipment; or to provide any increase in fire fighting and crash and rescue

equipment or personnel; or to conduct training or inspections for purposes of assisting the March IPAA with fire protection.

#### 8. PAYMENTS

a. For the purpose of reimbursing the Air Force for the March IPAA's share of the cost of maintaining and operating the joint use runway and flying facilities as provided in this Agreement, the March IPAA shall pay, with respect to civil aircraft authorized to use the Flying Facilities at MARB under this Agreement, the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) annually commencing the year beginning January 1, 2015, payable quarterly, which includes unlimited landings of all aircraft with a maximum gross take-off weight (MGTOW) of 40,000 pounds or less. A surcharge of twenty-five cents (\$.25) per thousand pounds of Maximum Landing Weight will be assessed for those aircraft weighing more than 40,000 pounds MGTOW, as compensation for repairs and construction on existing runways and taxiways. The surcharge is payable quarterly.

(1) Notwithstanding the foregoing: Any runway maintenance costs associated with civil operations that exceed what the Air Force normally experiences in maintaining and operating the runway at MARB shall be at the March IPAA's expense.

b. All charges and surcharges will be adjusted for inflation annually on the anniversary of this Agreement. The annual rate of inflation will be based on the *Consumer Price/Index-All Items*, not to exceed five percent (5%) annually. Inflation exceeding five percent (5%) will be carried over and added to the inflation adjustment for a year or years where the adjustment would otherwise be less than five percent (5%).

c. The March IPAA also shall pay any amounts required to reimburse the Air Force for expenses incurred for any services the Air Force provides under this Agreement,

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including but not limited to, additional tower or other essential airfield management services (paragraph 1), civil aircraft repair (paragraph 6), and fire fighting and/or crash and rescue services and materials (paragraph 7). Payment shall be made quarterly.

d. All payments due pursuant to this Agreement shall be payable to the order of the Treasurer of the United States of America, and shall be made to the Financial Services Officer, MARB, within thirty (30) days after each quarter. Quarters are deemed to end on December 31, March 31, June 30, and September 30. Payment shall be made promptly when due, without any deduction or setoff except as contemplated and agreed to in Paragraph 15. Interest at the rate prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States shall be due and payable on any payment required to be made under this Agreement that is not paid within ten (10) days after the date on which such payment is due and end on the day payment is received by the Air Force.

e. The March IPAA may collect fees and charges from civil aircraft authorized use of MARB under this Agreement; however, the March IPAA is responsible for payment to the Air Force as set forth in paragraph 8a whether or not fees are charged or collection efforts are successful. Civil aircraft operating at MARB on official government business are not subject to the March IPAA fees.

#### 9. LIABILITY AND INSURANCE

a. The March IPAA will assume all risk of loss and/or damage to property or injury to or death of persons by reason of civil aircraft use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities under this Agreement, including but not limited to, risks connected with the provision of services or goods by the Air Force to the March IPAA or to any user under this Agreement. The March IPAA further agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Air Force against, and to defend at the March IPAA expense, all claims for loss, damage, injury, or death

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sustained by any individual, corporation, or other entity and arising out of the use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities by civil aircraft authorized to use MARB by the March IPAA and/or the provision of services or goods by the Air Force, to the March IPAA or any user, whether the claims be based in whole, or in part, on the negligence or fault of the Air Force or its contractors or any of their officers, agents, and employees, or based on any concept of strict or absolute liability, or otherwise,

b. The March IPAA will carry a policy of liability and indemnity insurance satisfactory to the Air Force, naming the United States of America as an additional insured party, to protect the Government against any of the aforesaid losses and/or liability, in the sum of not less than fifty (50) million dollars bodily injury and property damage combined for any one accident. The March IPAA shall provide the Commander, 452 AMW, with a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage. A new certificate must be provided on the occasion of policy renewal or change in coverage. All policies shall provide that: (1) no cancellation, reduction in amount, or material change in coverage thereof shall be effective until at least thirty (30) days after receipt of notice of such cancellation, reduction, or change by the Commander, 452 AMW, (2) any losses shall be payable notwithstanding any act or failure to act or negligence of the March IPAA or the Air Force or any other person, and (3) the insurer shall have no right of subrogation against the Air Force.

#### 10. THIRD PARTY DOCUMENTS.

The March IPAA shall include in contracts, leases, or operating agreements with civil aircraft operators their responsibility to use flight routes, instrument approaches, and all other procedures established by the Air Force and the FAA for MARB, and for full compliance with applicable provisions of this Agreement.

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#### 11. TERM OF AGREEMENT.

a. This Agreement shall become effective immediately and shall remain in force and effect for a term of 25 years with an automatic 15 year extension provided MIPAA is in compliance with all terms of this agreement, unless otherwise renegotiated or terminated under the provisions of paragraph 12, but in no event shall this Agreement survive the termination or expiration of the March JPA's right to use, by license, lease, or transfer of ownership, of the land areas used in connection with use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities.

 b. Upon becoming effective, the Agreement shall supersede and cancel all previous agreements between the Parties concerning March JPA use of the Jointly Used Flying Facilities.

#### 12. <u>RENEGOTIATION SUSPENSION AND TERMINATION</u>

a. Except in the case of temporary emergency situations, if significant changes in circumstances or conditions relevant to this Agreement should occur, the Air Force and the March IPAA may enter into negotiations to revise the provisions of this Agreement, including financial and insurance provisions, upon sixty (60) days written notice to the other party. Any such revision or modification of this Agreement shall be processed as specified in AFI 10-1002, *Agreements for Civil Aircraft Use of Air Force Airfields*, and shall require the written mutual agreement and signatures of both parties. Unless such agreement is reached, this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect, subject to termination or suspension under this section. The Air Force, as represented by the Commander, 452 AMW, or designee, and the March IPAA, as represented by the Chair of the March IPAA or designee, agree in advance to review this Agreement annually in January.

b. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Air Force may temporarily suspend this Agreement at any time during any national or State emergency,

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present or future, declared by the President or the Congress of the United States or the State of California during the period of such emergency.

c. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Air Force may terminate this Agreement (1) at any time by the Secretary of the Air Force, giving ninety (90) days written notice to the March IPAA, provided that the Secretary of the Air Force determines, in writing, that paramount military necessity requires that joint use be terminated, or (2) in the event the March IPAA violates any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and continues and persists therein for thirty (30) days after written notification to cure such violation. In addition to the above rights, the Air Force may at any time suspend this Agreement if violations of its terms and conditions by the March IPAA create a significant danger to safety, public health, the environment, or exceed the emissions levels specified in paragraph l.c. and further described in Exhibit B, at MARB.

#### 13. GENERAL PROVISIONS

a. The March IPAA shall neither transfer nor assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Air Force.

b. The failure of either the Air Force or the March IPAA to insist, in any one or more instances, upon the strict performance of any of the terms, conditions, or provisions of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver or relinquishment of the right to the future performance of any such terms, conditions, or provisions. No provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived by either party unless such waiver is in writing signed by such party.

#### 14. <u>NOTICES.</u>

No notice, order, direction, determination, requirement, consent, or approval under this Agreement shall be of any effect unless it is in writing and received as provided herein.

#### 15. MAJOR REPAIRS AND NEW CONSTRUCTION

a. Major repair projects and/or new construction projects required for the Jointly Used Flying Facilities are not included under this Agreement (collectively, "Required Joint Use Projects"), and any March IPAA contribution to such projects shall be the subject of separate negotiations and written agreement between the Air Force as represented by the Commander, 452 AMW, and the March IPAA at such time as the work is required. Such an agreement may provide for crediting all or a portion of the costs of such projects to the payments due from the March IPAA for runway maintenance under this Agreement.

b. Major repair projects and/or new construction projects required for the Jointly Used Flying Facilities or contracts related to airfield operations or maintenance that are desirable for civil aircraft operations and are to be funded by the March IPAA (collectively "Desirable Joint Use Projects") also are not included under this Agreement and shall be the subject of separate negotiations and written agreement between the March IPAA and the Air Force as represented by the Commander, 452 AMW, at such time as the work is desired. Such an agreement may provide for crediting all or a portion of the direct March IPAA funded

contributions of such projects to the payments due from the March IPAA for runway maintenance under this Agreement.

#### 16. OTHER AGREEMENTS NOT AFFECTED.

This Agreement does not affect the MARB/Riverside City and County Fire Mutual Aid Agreement,


